## HERBERT BÖCK

Herbert Böck received his first musical education as a member of the Vienna Boys Choir under the guidance of professors Großmann and Gillesberger appearing as a soprano soloist in the famous recordings of Bach cantatas with Nikolaus Harnoncourt and the Concentus Musicus. He studied oboe, conducting, composition and music education at the Vienna Academy of Music. From 1985 unitl 1990 he held the position of lead oboist with the Radio Symphony Orchestra Vienna.

In his position as chief conductor of the *Concentus Vocalis*, he achieved early recognition and awards at international competitions, including first place at the International Choir Competition "*Walther von der Vogelweide*" in Innsbruck in 1982, first place in the chamber choir category and first place overall at the competition of the *European Broadcasting Union* in 1987 in Helsinki (Winner of the *Silver Rose Bowl of the BBC*, and the *Ferdinand Großmann Award* for extraordinary achievements in choir music in 1991.

From 1989-98 he was musical director of the *Wiener Singakademie* involving regular conducting commitments at the *Vienna Konzerthaus*.

In 1989 Herbert Böck was appointed chief conductor of the Vienna Jeunesse Orchestra.

In 1995 he was appointed professor of choral and ensemble conducting at the *Salzburg University of Music "Mozarteum*".

As maestro he has worked with the Wind Ensemble of the Wiener Philharmoniker, the Wiener Kammerorchester, the Akademie St. Michael (Vienna), the Wiener Akademie, the Mozarteum Orchester (Salzburg) and Niederösterreichisches Tonkünstlerorchester. At the Vienna Konzerthaus he conducted important oeuvres for choir & orchestra, such as Honegger's oratorio Le Roi David, Orff's Carmina Burana, Bach's St. John-Passion and High Mass in B-Minor, Kagel's St. Bach-Passion, and a concert series with Handel oratorios including Jephtha, The Messiah, Solomon and Judas Maccabaeus. In March 1998, he directed a highly acclaimed performance of Frank Martin's oratorio Golgotha (including a CD release).

Various concert tours have taken him across Europe, Russia, Israel, Turkey and the USA in the past few years. He has conducted concerts with the Oslo Philharmonic Orchestra, the Choir and Orchestra of Den Norske Opera Oslo (including The Messiah and a production of The Magic Flute), the Orchestra Santa Cecilia di Roma, the Orchestre Philharmonique de Radio France, the Letvian National Symphony Orchestra, the RSO Budapest, the Slovenia Philharmonic, etc. He has also worked as a guest conductor with the Radio Choirs of the WDR Cologne and MDR Leipzig, the Rundfunkchor Berlin and the Berkshire Choral Festival in the USA. Further engagements with the Oslo Philharmonic Orchestra, Den Norske Opera Oslo, Göteborg Symphony Orchesta, Malmö Symphony Orchestra, Trondheim Symphony Orchestra and Stavanger Symphony Orchestra.
